

We also delivered different capacity-building workshops for more than 800 organizations and provided training to more than 400 people through our MerceDigital platform.

Additionally, we fostered and developed key relationships across sectors and actors in accordance with our mission to co-create and to collaborate in building a social sector ecosystem that is more resilient, relevant, more assertive and timelier in terms of a gender and non-discrimination lens, and active civil society, governance and leadership.

With commitment and spirit of co-building, and in partnership for the common good, we will continue to invest, recognize and strengthen the sector!
















## Flowing

This program promotes CSO projects that contribute to reducing the lack of access to water for the use of people who live in localities with a high degree of Institutional disenfranchisement through the equipment and installation of Rainwater Harvesting Systems (RHS).



<sup>1</sup> A RHS is an eco-technology designed to intercept, collect and store rainwater. This system has several components allowing collection of water that naturally precipitates, as well as filtration of impurities that the collected water may contain, the transportation of the water to the collection infrastructure, and the storage of water for later distribution and use in different activities in the home.

In October we met to discuss, reflect on and exchange ideas on civic engagement as seen by different actors and spaces in Mexico to promote and encourage active participations through CSO´s.



During the Monterrey Forum, the section: Myths and Realities of Organized Civil Society, was dedicated to supporting the formation of participatory citizenship in Nuevo Leon (through the knowledge of best practices of CSOs and neighborhood groups). In addition, Merced Foundation participated with the capsule: Myth: Government and Civil Society Are Incompatible since we sustain that we must work collaboratively among all sectors.



Learning Round. Gender Equity Within the Organizations and Outside in the Territories.

During the XII International RedEAmérica Forum, organizations belonging to the node like ADO Foundation, Cemex, Banco BDH León, and Merced Foundation held this roundtable to study in more detail the importance of promoting measures and actions within different companies, foundations, institutes, and outside territories for advancing gender equity in Latin America. It also sought to share experiences and lessons on this field's progress, tasks, and challenges.







A partir de años recientes se le ha asignado este término dado el interés de estudiarla más a fondo,<sup>1</sup> pero la hemos encontrado en la forma de distintos nombres como el tequio<sup>2</sup> proveniente del México prehispánico pinshi<sup>3</sup> desde Ecuador o el minga o minka<sup>4</sup> en las comunidades precolombinas, etc. Se basa en las lecciones y la experiencia de financiadoras y otras organizaciones que buscan apoyar, fortalecer y isociarse con las comunidades para alcanzar las prioridades de éstas. Se difere cia de la práctic filantrópica tradicional, en que busca conscientemente 'trasladar el poder'5 desde las prioridades de desarrollo, hacia las comunidades locales (Knight 2019). La manera y experiencia en cómo se vive el apoyo a la filantropía comunitaria varían de una

organización a otra y dependen en gran medida del contexto, las culturas, las historias y el compromiso de las comunidades para incidir en su propia transformación, ¿Qué podemos aprender de estas prácticas para colaborar con quienes quieren transitar su propio apoyo hacia los enfoques "dirigidos por la comunidad"? ¿Y cómo puede este apoyo marcar la diferencia en una amplia variedad de retos sociales, ambientales, económicos, políticos y culturales tan compleios?

Este marco busca integrar la experiencia actual para que sea adaptada y utilizada por las organizaciones de financiamiento en México para guiar su propia práctica. No es un manifiesto ni un autoridad en la práctica de la filantropía comunitaria, y responde a un vacío en nuestro conocimiento para estimular la discusión y proponer definiciones, ideas y principios que puedan ser un trampolín para desarrollar y fortalecer las prácticas de la filantropía comunitaria misma.

## Institutional Strengthening of Civil Society Organizations in Mexico: Strategies for their Effectiveness

Together with the Center for Research and Studies on Civil Society (CIESC) and the Universidad ORT Mexico, we carried out this study to understand the progress of strengthening in the country and present an x-ray of the current situation. We also mapped the strengthening agents and their service offerings, analyzing the weight and characteristics of the strengthening processes among CSOs.






## Institutional Policy and Strategy on Gender Perspective and Non-Discrimination.

3-. Action plan to move forward on gender equality and non-discrimination in the organizational culture.










## Strengthening our Governance and Collaborative Leadership


